# Just the **FACTS:** An NEA-NH Factsheet

## **Five Talking Points on Vouchers**

“What have you got against private school vouchers?” you’re asked. Next time someone puts you on the spot, use these talking points to debunk the most popular voucher claims.

### **Fact: There’s no link between vouchers and gains in student achievement.**

There’s no conclusive evidence that vouchers improve the achievement of students who use them to attend private school. Nor is there any validity to claims that, by creating a “competitive marketplace” for students, vouchers force public schools to improve. In fact, the most dramatic improvements in student achievement have occurred in places where vouchers do not exist — such as Texas, North Carolina, Connecticut and Chicago. Instead, those states and communities focused on teacher quality and extra help for students who need it.

### **Fact: Vouchers undermine accountability for public funds.**

Private schools have almost complete autonomy with regard to how they operate: who they teach, what they teach, how they teach, how — if at all — they measure student achievement, how they manage their finances, and what they are required to disclose to parents and the public. The absence of public accountability for voucher funds has contributed to rampant fraud, waste and abuse in current voucher programs.

### **Fact: Vouchers do not reduce public education costs.**

Actually, they increase costs, by requiring taxpayers to fund two school systems, one public and one private. Reductions in state aid to public schools to pay for the vouchers results in substantial increases in property taxes.

### **Fact: Vouchers do not give parents real educational choice.**

Participating private schools may limit enrollment, and in many cases may maintain exclusive admissions policies and charge tuition and fees far above the amount provided by the voucher. Unlike public schools, private and religious schools can — and do — discriminate in admissions on the basis of prior academic achievement, standardized test scores, interviews with applicants and parents, gender, religion, income, special needs, and behavioral history.

### **Fact: The public disapproves of vouchers.**

By overwhelming margins, Americans prefer improving their public schools to spending scarce tax dollars on voucher programs. Since 1966, vouchers or voucher-related measures have been placed before voters in 13 states and the District of Columbia 22 times. With the lone exception of South Dakota — which approved the provision of textbooks to parochial schools in 1986 — voters have rejected public aid to private and religious schools every time. In those 22 elections, nearly two out of three voters cast “no” votes.

**NATIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATION-NEW HAMPSHIRE  
WESTERN REGION  
CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS**

**ARTICLE I**

**MEMBERSHIP**

Active membership on the Regional Council shall be open to members acting as representatives from all local Associations in the Western Region which are unified and affiliated with NEA-NH.

**ARTICLE II**

**OFFICERS**

The officers of the Association shall be Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer. They shall be members of the Regional Council. The officers shall be elected by the Regional Council on an annual basis at the June meeting. State Executive Board Representative from Region is not required to be Chairperson.

**ARTICLE III**

**VOTING MEMBERS OF THE REGIONAL COUNCIL**

SECTION 1 The voting members of the Regional Council shall consist of the NEA-NH Elected Regional Representative(s) to the NEA-NH Executive Board and up to a maximum of one representative from each local within the region.

SECTION 2 Whenever a majority of the Regional Council shall agree that a Council Member has been consistently negligent of his/her duties, the Council shall have the power to remove that individual by a 2/3 majority vote.

SECTION 3 All Regional Council Members shall have unified membership and come from a dues paying local.

**ARTICLE IV**

**MEETINGS**

SECTION 1 The Regional Council shall meet in September and schedule at least five meetings during the school year, exclusive of the Membership Dinner.

SECTION 2 The officers of the Regional Council and the budget shall be voted on at the June meeting, as well as all other issues it determines.

SECTION 3 Officers of the Regional Council may call special meetings at any time.

## **ARTICLE V**

### **QUORUM**

A quorum shall be six (6) members of the regional executive council.

## **ARTICLE VI**

### **POWERS OF OFFICERS**

SECTION 1 The chairperson shall preside over all meetings of the Regional Council, appoint the chairpersons and members of committees, approve expenditures of money by the Treasurer and perform all other functions usually attributed to this office.

SECTION 2 The Vice Chairperson shall perform all functions usually attributed to the office. She/he shall become the Chairperson if the Chair becomes vacant.

SECTION 3 The Secretary shall carry out all duties customarily performed by a secretary, including providing minutes of the meetings, to be emailed to Chairperson.

SECTION 4 The Treasurer shall carry out all functions customarily performed by a Treasurer. She/he shall: (1) authorize the payment of all expenditures approved by the Regional Council (2) be responsible for receiving and banking all fees and other Council moneys; and (3) disburse such funds in payment of bills and other council transactions approved by the Regional Council. A financial report shall be made annually by the Treasurer.

### SECTION 5 Terms and Succession

- A. The officers shall serve for one (1) year and may be reelected without an intervening term.
- B. The Regional Representative(s) to the NEA-NH Executive Board should serve for terms concurrent with their state terms. The NEA-NH Constitution will determine the number of representatives to the Western Region.
- C. Terms of office shall commence at the September meeting of each year.

## **ARTICLE VII**

### **POWER OF REGIONAL COUNCIL**

SECTION 1 The Regional Council shall be the governing body of the region. It shall approve the budget, establish policies on funding regional programs, act on reports of committees, and approve resolutions and other policy statements. All appropriate powers

not delegated to the officers or other groups of the region shall be vested in the Regional Council.

SECTION 2 The Regional Council shall make recommendations in the hiring of a UniServ Director subject to agreement with NEA-NH.

## **ARTICLE VIII**

### **COMMITTEES**

The Chairperson may appoint committees which are necessary to carry out the business of the Association.

## **ARTICLE IX**

### **AUTHORITY**

Robert's Rules of Order shall be the parliamentary authority for the Association on all questions not covered by Articles of Agreement and Bylaws and such standing rules as the Council Members may adopt.

## **ARTICLE X**

### **FUNDING**

Subject to these bylaws, the funding of regional programs and stipends for Regional Council Officers shall be determined by the Regional Council by a majority vote of those present and voting at any duly called meeting.

## **ARTICLE XI**

### **AMENDMENTS**

These bylaws may be amended at any meeting of the Regional Council by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the voting members of the council present, provided that such proposed amendments shall have been presented at a hearing at least fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting or provided that notice and proposed amendments shall have been sent to each local president or designee.

2 minutes: (minutes 1-2)	A. What is SB 193?	SB 193 is a voucher bill that will allow eligible students to take state adequacy dollars out of public schools and use them at private (including religious) schools, and even for home schooling with virtually no oversight.	Our budget is already stretched to the breaking point. This bill will take the little state aid our district already receives, while not actually effecting the cost of services that need to be provided to provide our students the quality education that New Hampshire students already receive. Bottom line, if this is passed, we will once again be asked to do with less.
4 minutes: (minutes 3-5)	B. How will this bill effect our district?	According to an independent analysis by Reaching Higher, our district stands to lose \$XXX in the first year and \$XXX over the first five years. (See attached Town by Town Voucher Est in rows 2 and 5 for your district)	What do you think will happen if our budget gets cut by \$XXX? I know no one likes to be told "call your congressman," but the bottom line is that it works. <u>Make sure that you tell them that you are a constituent</u> , and that you need them to vote against this bill because our public schools are already underfunded. Let them know that public schools are there to educate everyone, unlike private and religious schools. Let them know public dollars should stay in public schools.
1 minute (minute 10)	D. We did this on Right-to-Work, we can do this again!	NEA-NH members sent over 2,000 post cards, made 6,000 phone calls, and who knows how many emails on Right-to-Work. Let's do it again.	New Hampshire had no business defeating Right-to-Work in our current political climate. But we did, and because of that New Hampshire's educators will continue to have the work conditions that allow New Hampshire to have the best schools in the country.
